Program Statement of Purpose

The Korean Intensive Summer Language Program (KISLP) in Cheongju, South Korea will provide eight weeks of intensive Korean language instruction. The program will take place at Chungbuk National University (CBNU). The curriculum will focus on the four modalities of speaking, listening, reading, and writing, as well as immersion in Korean culture, through 19 hours of classroom instruction each week. Students will also participate in a language pledge and strengthen their language skills with locals through activities and excursions designed to reinforce their understanding of Korean culture and language. The eight-week intensive summer program is equivalent to two semesters of study in the US.

Curriculum Overview

The Korean language faculty at Chungbuk National University provide a highly demanding, total immersion academic program to Korean Intensive Summer Language Program participants. Classes are held five days per week, three sessions per day, and include one Korean grammar, reading, and writing lecture and drilling class; one situational conversation and discussion class; and one reading and listening personalized instruction class. In addition, CBNU students will be paired with KISLP students as language partners offering conversational Korean sessions and support with class materials for three hours each week. Students are required to actively participate in all classes, cultural enrichments, excursions, and ceremonies. Student evaluation will cover attendance and participation, quizzes and tests, midterm and final, oral presentations, and homework.

Policies

Attendance and Participation

Students who miss classes or excursions without a valid medical excuse or other approved reason will be subject to verbal and written warnings and the possibility of lowered grades. Students are required to actively participate in all classes, cultural enrichments, excursions, and ceremonies.

Preparation and Self-Study

This program is highly demanding, and students should expect to spend three to four hours on class preparation and self-study daily. This preparation should include both written and audio texts, as well as vocabulary and sentence patterns.

Completion of Homework

Students are assigned homework in each class and are expected to complete it by the date indicated by their teacher. Instructors factor student work into planning for future classes; timely completion of all assigned homework allows teachers to more accurately gauge student progress and effectively utilize class time. Homework is graded and will factor into students' overall course grades.

Daily Quizzes, Weekly Tests, Midterm & Final Exams

Korean language faculty at Chungbuk National University will administer all quizzes, tests, and exams. Quizzes focus on new daily materials introduced in class and are held during lecture and drill classes. Weekly tests mainly review what students have learned during the week. The two-hour long midterm and final written exams are to help students review what they have learned during the preceding four weeks. A final oral exam is held on the last day of the program.

Oral Presentation

Students will give two formal oral presentations over the course of the program. Students are required to organize three minutes of content and orally present it to their peers in class. All presentations should be reviewed for grammatical errors in collaboration with one-on-one class instructors.

Korean Language Pledge

Students are required to sign a language pledge and are expected to speak Korean both to classmates and to teachers throughout the duration of the program. The language pledge requires students to speak only Korean in the following settings:

- In all program classes
- On the grounds of the program institute (including in hallways and cafeterias)
- On group excursions and trips
- With other program students
- With their roommates
- With their language partners
- When speaking with local staff, officials, and teachers

Course Descriptions

KORN 201 (1 unit of Bryn Mawr College academic credit—4 undergraduate/5 graduate credit hours)

Intermediate Korean Speaking and Listening

This course is designed for those who have previously studied one academic year of Korean at the university level and have already achieved some elementary Korean communicative skills. This course aims to help students acquire more colloquial usage and daily conversation skills and focuses on conversation, presentation, listening, and drilling through practical usage and content while discussing such topics as hobbies, club activities, weekend routines, travel destinations, sending packages, and giving directions.

In addition to a daily lecture and drill session, this course also includes a daily small group conversation and discussion class. In the conversation and discussion session, students develop and improve their interpersonal, interpretive, and presentational skills in a variety of authentic contexts and situations by means of meaningful conversation, oral presentations, speeches, and debates. All discussion topics reinforce content introduced in lecture and drill sessions.

KORN 202 (1 unit of Bryn Mawr College academic credit—4 undergraduate/5 graduate credit hours)

Intermediate Korean Grammar, Reading, and Writing

This course is designed for those who have previously studied one academic year of Korean at the university level with exposure to some elementary-level vocabulary and grammar patterns. In this course, students learn fundamental higher elementary Korean vocabulary and patterns while reading a variety of higher elementary-level texts. Students are expected to learn approximately 650 new words and 60 new grammar patterns while covering 14 topics including: hobbies, experiences, shopping, traveling, post office, street names in Korea, telephone information directories, restaurant review, healthy lifestyle, personality test, places you live, and cultural differences. Regular assessments include daily quizzes, weekly tests, homework, and class participation.

In addition to a daily lecture and drill session, this course also includes a daily one-on-one personalized language exchange with trained Korean graduate students outside of the classroom. In the personalized language sessions, students will reinforce reading and speaking abilities according to their individual needs and interests. Teachers will correct erroneous language output as well as work closely with students to refine written projects, oral presentation drafts, field tasks, exams, and homework.
